

Fernandez presents at #NWILL Conference

On September 18, Head of RGC Library Services **Mike Fernandez** presented a virtual presentation entitled "Delivering Knowledge: Implementing Mail-Based Interlibrary Loan Services" at the Northwest InterLibrary Loan Conference (#NWILL). This session explored the implementation of a pilot program designed to facilitate mailing interlibrary loan materials to our distance learning community. This initiative specifically targets students, staff, and faculty located in the Texas border communities of Eagle Pass, Del Rio, and Uvalde, where our institution operates three remote campuses. This effort acknowledges the reality that patrons in these areas often face significant barriers to accessing resources outside of physical and electronic collections.

Lacey attends HACU Conference

In November, Title V Project Director **Michelle Lacey** attended the Hispanic Association of Colleges and Universities (HACU) Annual Conference in Aurora, Colorado alongside SRSU faculty and staff Cynthia McAlister, Julie Vega, Dafne Westerlink, and over 2,800 registrants from Hispanic Serving Institutions. The SRSU representatives also attended the pre-conference Women's Leadership Symposium. The group attended workshops pertaining to empowering Latinx students, HSI "Servingness," mitigating silos, higher education legal updates, and preparing the next generation of culturally diverse leaders, among others.

The Archives of the Big Bend Takes American Archives Month by Storm

The Archives of the Big Bend was abuzz with outreach events and researchers this October in celebration of <u>American Archives Month</u>. American Archives Month is a nationwide event celebrated by archival repositories and professional organizations to highlight the importance of records of enduring value to our nation's intellectual heritage. In previous years, our Archives has celebrated by offering undergraduate and graduate workshops as well as class lectures on our collections and general archival research and participating in regional outreach events.

This year, the Archives continued those traditions and added two online events. We celebrated National Electronic Records Day (#ERecsDay) by creating and sharing an infographic discussing some basic best practice advice for organizing and preserving digital records of long-term value. We also celebrated national Ask an Archivist Day (#AskAnArchivist), a day every October when archivists from all types of repositories invite their patrons and the general public to ask any questions they've ever had about archives, archivists, or our collections through social media, blogs, and newsletters. We took it

one step further and offered two Online Office Hours sessions where SRSU students, faculty, and staff were welcome to pop in and ask their questions and chat. These events led to some wonderful questions and feedback.

The Research Roundup also returned to the Archives of the Big Bend this year. The Roundup is a campus lecture and relationship-building event where faculty and staff are invited to the Archives to learn about the services and collections available to the SRSU community, especially highlighting their utility in multi-disciplinary research. This year we had brief presentations from staff and current researchers, as well as the opportunity to ask questions and meet



individually to brainstorm personalized curriculum collaborations. Some highlights from this year included a fun round of "Guess the Research Request" where audience members tried to guess what research questions were answered using archival photographs, a lively talk by our favorite Texas Master Naturalist, Lindsey Bredemeyer, on his archival research in bat roost conservation, and an inspiring conversation with a group of undergraduate researchers as they prepared for their upcoming Center for Big Bend Studies Conference poster presentation on their archival research on indigenous communities of Fort Leaton.



Finally, Archivist **Victoria Contreras** traveled to Las Cruces, New Mexico for the Border Region Archives Group's 8th annual Archives Bazaar held October 19 at the New Mexico Farm & Ranch Museum. This free all-day event invites members of the general public to visit dozens of regional archives and other cultural heritage repositories as they display rare and unique items from their collections. This year, 24 unique repositories exhibited materials and chatted with the nearly 200 archive enthusiasts of all ages who visited their display tables. Preparations have begun for the 2025 BRAG Archives Bazaar, so keep an eye out for it and other archival events next Fall.

Collections Chats: Improving Access, Evolving Reserves + Textbook Collections

We believe increasing faculty voice in decision-making and analysis of physical and electronic resource content increases the return on investment of our limited collections budget. Collections Chats are our invitation for faculty engagement in the evaluation of resources for their area(s) of expertise.

Library and Archives-funded resources are selected according to policy and procedure informed by historic practice, data, and industry standards. SRSU Librarians have recently updated the <u>Collection Development and Maintenance Strategy</u> to align with current best practices of the LIS (Library and Information Science) field. We expect to continue to evolve this document as we (a) fully onboard **Maggie Bootman** as Head of Collection Development and Technical Services (librarian) and (b) collaborate with students, faculty, staff, and administration on the future library space in Eagle Pass.

This round of Chats will solicit feedback about individual journal titles (physical and electronic) as well as the Course Reserves and Textbook Collections as they relate to the <u>Sully Shelf Program</u>.

Annual SRSU Library Collection Development and Maintenance: Deadlines and Info New Acquisitions and Annual Content Reviews and Renewals

- Physical books are typically acquired on fixed ordering dates, budget-permitting
 - Regular order dates are October 1, December 1, March 1, May 1, July 1
- Regarding library-funded course readings (<u>textbooks</u>), order deadlines are as follows:
 - October 1 for Spring Term
 - March 1 for Summer Terms
 - May 1 for Fall Term
- Rush orders are considered; processing times vary. We aim to get material on the shelves as fast as possible.
- We are now accepting collections recommendations for the Eagle Pass location (D-129).
- **Electronic content (eBooks, databases, etc.)** is reviewed annually, typically acquired on a rolling basis, budget-permitting.
- **Physical and Electronic Journal content** is reviewed annually, typically acquired on a calendar-year basis (January to December) with a September renewal period, budget-permitting.
- Other formats and special-circulation items (such as calculators) are considered and acquired on a rolling basis, budget-permitting.

Donations

Donations are accepted at all times, but are reviewed for addition to the collections on a monthly basis by librarians. Processing times of donations varies based on a variety of factors. More information about giving to the library is online at: library.sulross.edu/giving.
